Transfer Services Now On Facebook and Twitter

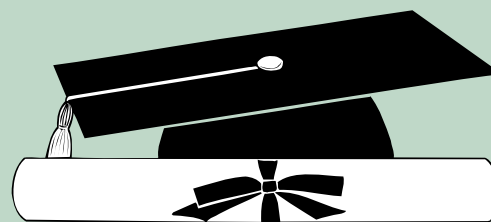

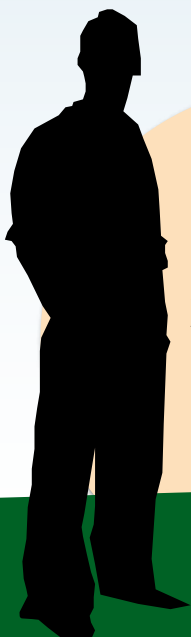

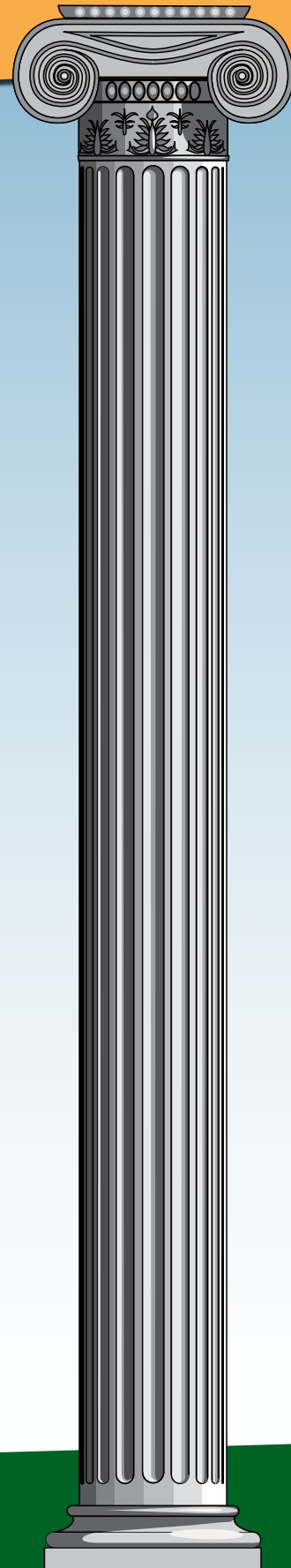

University Spotlight

Western Washington University has been ranked as the best regional public university in the Pacific Northwest and no. 2 in the Western United States by U.S. News and World Report for 11 years in a row. It has an enrollment of 13,000 students and is large enough to offer a great choice of academic programs, people to meet, and things to do; yet small enough that you won't get lost in the crowd. Undergraduates take advantage of unique opportunities to engage in research and showcase their work regionally and nationally, which are experiences frequently reserved for graduate students at larger institutions. More than 98 percent of their classes are taught by distinguished faculty, whereas at many larger universities, you might have graduate students teaching many of the classes.

Global awareness is a high priority as WWU works to connect with people, cultures, and events in other countries.
