Agile Project Management: Scrum & Kanban

Many companies use a combination of both traditional and Agile PM methods to implement requirements. Additionally, Agile is a focus area on the PMP® Certification exam. This course features Agile methodology, highlighting Scrum and Kanban. Learn the Agile process, explore roles and responsibilities of the product owner, ScrumMaster and team, develop product and sprint backlogs, and build “fun” products using the methodology. Our goal -- prepare you to enter an Agile environment and succeed. This class can be accomplished virtually or in-class with similar positive results.

All project managers, leaders, managers and contributors who work in an environment where Agile Project Management is practiced need this class! In addition, those desiring Project Management Institute (PMI)® certifications such as Project Management Professional (PMP)® or Certified Associate in Project Management (CAPM)® will greatly benefit from knowledge learned in this course. This is the fifth required course in the Project Management Certificate.

- Describe the types of Agile project management frameworks used to manage projects.
- Identify key roles and responsibilities associated with an Agile framework
- Summarize the Product Owner and explain key roles
- Describe the job of the ScrumMaster, and list how it differs from that of a traditional Project Manager
- Summarize the role of the team

Define the end-to-end Agile framework

- Explain the Product Backlog
- Define User Stories
- Summarize the Sprint Backlog
- Explain the daily stand-up meeting methodology
- Explain the purpose of the Demo
- Describe the retrospective and its value
- Demonstrate proficiency in Scrum

Describe Kanban as a method to achieve project goals

- Explain how Kanban differs from other Agile methodologies
- Discuss a Kanban board and how it works
- Demonstrate proficiency in Kanban

Summarize challenges in an Agile environment

- Summarize key challenges in implementing Agile
- Explain why Agile may fail to achieve objectives
- Summarize methods to “sell” Agile
